

### Question Type 1 – Access, Location and Retrieval

These kinds of questions are usually low mark questions, and require you to find key information in the text. They can often be a 'find and copy' question, or a multiple choice question.

In both Unit 2 and Unit 3, you will be asked 3 multiple choice questions. These kinds of questions are used to test a number of skills, including:

- locating (finding) the correct information to answer;
- deducing (working out) word meaning;
- deciding the purpose of the text;
- showing understanding of text or words in context; and •
- verbal reasoning skills.

# Question Type 1 – Access, Location and Retrieval (Multiple Choice)

Remember- In <u>both Unit 2 and Unit 3</u>, you will be asked **3 multiple choice questions**. These kinds of questions are used to test a number of skills, including:

- Locating (finding) the correct information to answer;
- Deducing (working out) word meaning;
- Deciding the purpose of the text;
- Showing understanding of text or words in context;
- Verbal reasoning skills.

Miss Moore says... This is a 'purpose of the text' question. Remind yourself of the 4 text purposes, and make your choice.

#### Text Purposes

Personal – Written for people to read for their own interest/pleasure.

**Public** – Written so people can get information about public events or information about society. (News articles, official documents and leaflets).

Occupational – Written for tasks linked to jobs and the workplace.

**Educational** – Written to help with gaining knowledge – they give instructions and information. They are written to help people learn, and probably given rather than chosen by the reader.

This kind of multiple choice is testing your 'understanding of the words/phrase in the context' of the text. There is only one true correct answer, but the other answers will be 'distractors' designed to throw you off.

These kinds of questions will require you to put something in the correct order. One answer will be completed for you. Make sure you do not repeat the answer!





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### Question Type 3 – Analysis – the 'How' Question

These kinds of questions are **likely to be 5 or 10 mark questions**, and you WILL need to pick out quotations from the text to support all of your ideas. You will need to explain ALL of your chosen quotations.

When relevant, you should comment on the writer's techniques/use of language and explain why it's effective. DO NOT ALLOW YOUR RESPONSE TO BE DRIVEN BY FINDING FEATURES FIRST!

- Look to see how many marks the question is worth.
- Read through the extract, highlighting as you go.
- Choose quotes from the whole extract, not just one part.
- Write up your response chronologically by tracking through the text.

### Question Type 4 – Thoughts and Feelings

This kind of questions is likely to be higher mark question (5 marks).

Always check the focus of your response.

When constructing an answer and it's asking for your thoughts and feelings, use 'I think... I feel' to frame a response.

**Example**: We first learn that Tristram "likes to rummage in bins" which <u>makes me think</u> that he is strange as this is not normal behaviour.

If you are struggling with this, look on the next page for some help.

## Question Type 4 – Help: Thoughts and Feelings

<u>Evidence</u>	<u>Thoughts or feelings</u>
"likes to rummage in bins"	
"a bin full of chucked-out food is not an object of physical revulsion"	
"In his garden he grows vegetables and keeps bees; he shoots squirrels and deer."	
"supermarket dustbins are still the "mainstay" of his diet"	
"Perfect!" he says.	

### Question Type 5 – Synthesis Question Help

#### **Synthesis**

Definition: Synthesis is the skill of bringing together information from different sources to create a new text.


Advice to candidates on answering synthesis questions

- · A clear focus on the question is essential
- · Synthesis does not require any form of comparison
- Candidates should avoid generalisations/blurring messages from texts (e.g. 'All of the texts say...').

'Synthesise' means to 'put together'.



<u>Do</u> <u>not</u> <u>compare</u> the texts! You are not looking for similarities and differences. You are putting information together from different texts.

<u>Do not copy big chunks</u> of the texts.
