Annual Report to Parents 2017-18

The following summary relates to progress towards our improvement plan during the school year 2017-18. It is divided into the same sections as those used under the common inspection framework. The report also includes statistical analyses of exam results and a budget statement. We have incorporated comments on progress towards our School Improvement Plan (SIP) in the relevant sections. Copies of the full SIP are available from the school.

At the time of the January 2018 school census, Prestatyn High School had 1568 on roll with 315 in the sixth form compared to 1663 on roll with 349 in the sixth form in 2017.

1.1 Standards

Performance at both Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4 is judged against schools the Welsh Government judge to be similar based on a range of criteria including the percentage of pupils who are entitled to free school meals. They use this information to group schools into bands then divide the schools into quartiles. Quartile 1 represents the top performing 25% of schools in that band. We are also placed within a 'family' of similar schools for further comparisons, as well as being compared with other Denbighshire schools and the Welsh average. At the time of writing this report the Welsh Government had not released benchmark data.

KS3

KS3 results were encouraging this year with a rise in both English, Science and the core subject indicator at Level 5, with Maths maintaining its level from last year. The vast majority of pupils achieve a level 5 or above in English, Maths and Science. The school performs above both local authority and national averages for the core subjects. In non-core subjects the performance is strong with many subjects above national and local authority averages. There is particularly strong performance in History, Geography and ICT. More able and talented pupils achieve well with the numbers achieving Level 7 in English and Maths well above national averages, and the number of pupils achieving exceptional performance in History being 4 times the national average.

KS4

GCSE qualifications continue to be reformed in Wales with a greater emphasis on challenge and rigour with less coursework and a reduction in linear examinations. The Welsh Government has also amended BTEC qualifications with all BTECs now containing an examination element and only two BTECs can be counted towards the L1 and L2 threshold.

Students achieving A*-C in English Language decreased by 11% to 58% which is due to the Welsh Government, and the WJEC, increasing the mark needed to achieve a C grade. A mark of 200 would have been sufficient to gain a C grade in summer 2017 but this boundary was increased to 220 in summer 2018. As a results of the grade boundary increase 26 of our students missed out on achieving a C grade in English Language.

Whilst every year there are small fluctuations in the grade boundaries, we believe that the changes seen this year fall significantly beyond the acceptable range and are therefore unreasonable, unjustified and have unfairly disadvantaged young people. In addition, these changes followed a clear direction from the Cabinet Secretary to 'discourage widespread early entry' and as a result young people within the same year group in Denbighshire have witnessed huge inconsistency in the standards required to achieve a Grade C.

Since the examination results were released and the grade boundaries were published, I, along with all of the Denbighshire Headteachers, have petitioned the WJEC, Qualifications Wales and the Welsh Government to have this decision reversed and for the papers to be regraded. We have demanded that all students have a fair and equal chance to achieve a C grade regardless of when they sat their English Language qualification.

Unfortunately, we have been unable to change this decision and thus far we have not received a satisfactory response from Qualifications Wales, the independent statutory body that oversees the standards to which qualifications are awarded.

Consequently, we are now escalating this matter to Mrs Kirsty Williams, the Cabinet Secretary for Education and are also meeting with elected members to explore further ways in which we can address this injustice.

Outcomes in maths remained the same with 62% of our students achieving an A*-C. Whilst pleased with the outcome, we are not complacent, and we continue to work hard to further improve standards.

New GCSE science qualifications were rolled out in Wales. BTEC science was no longer available and nearly all pupil were expected to sit two GCSEs. As was anticipated there was a reduction in the GCSE outcome with 48% of the cohort achieving an A*-C in science.

To support the delivery of the new Science GCSEs, and to raise standards, there have been several staffing appointments made within the department. Areas of weakness have been identified and actions are being taken to ensure standards improve. For the first time we have a group of students studying triple science; we await their outcome in the summer of 2019

Despite these challenges we are extremely proud of the hard work of our staff and students which saw 46% of the cohort of 246 students achieving 5 high grade passes (grade C or above) including English language and maths. This was a 7% reduction upon last year which is due to the grade boundary changes in English Language.

Performance in the indicator that includes all subjects (the level 2 threshold) shows very strong outcomes in many subjects. This is a source of particular pride as it enables our pupils to progress to level 3 courses, either in the 6th form or further education. 96% of students achieved 5 passes of any grade showing our curriculum allows all pupils to achieve.

KS₅

In the sixth form, 97% of learners eligible achieved the level 3 threshold though the average points score was below comparators at 624 it was an improvement of 42 points on the previous year. This can partly be accounted for by the improvement in the A*-C grade performance from 54% to 70%. In the sixth form, 99% of learners eligible achieved the level 3 threshold, which was above the LA and Wales figures, though the average points score was below comparators at 638.5 it was an improvement of 33.5 points on the previous year. Had all of last year's Yr13 done the WBQ and achieved at least a C grade then our AVG wider point score would have been 848 and this bodes well for the current Yr13 who are all doing the WBQ and have just achieved the best AS results the school has ever had. ALPS graded the AS results as a 3 putting the current Yr13 in the top 25% of all cohorts in the country. It is clear that much more work needs to be done to ensure that our 6th form students are achieving the top grades at A-level. This will continue to be a high priority going forward this year and in the years to follow.

Special praise must go to the current Yr13 who AS grades put them in the top 25% of all learners in the country as measured by ALPS. Scoring grade 3 on ALPS in Yr12 is a fantastic achievement and the best we have ever had.

We are delighted that most 6th formers have gone on to study subjects they are passionate about at degree level. 78 students progressed to higher education at universities all over the country including Jack Bailey who is currently studying Law at Cambridge University. We are again delighted that currently not one Yr13 student has been recorded as NEET for the second third in a row. Well done the class of 2018!

Curriculum Support

In January 2018, there were 288 pupils in key stages 3 and 4 on the school's Special Educational Needs Register at School Action, School Action + and with Statements, this equates to 24% of all pupils in KS3/4. At key stage 5 there were 18 students, equating to 8% of the 6th form students. Overall 11 pupils (around 0.8% of the school population) have a statement of Special Educational Need. Special arrangements for pupils with specific and other learning difficulties who met the criteria were obtained from the appropriate examining boards for their external examinations.

More able and talented

More able and talented students continue to be identified, supported and monitored from the point of transitions to external exams. 11% of our KS4 pupils achieved at least 5 grade A or A*, a similar outcome to the previous year.

Disadvantaged pupils

A national priority for all schools is to support the performance of disadvantaged pupils. Our teaching approaches are inclusive for all pupils with the school open from 08.00 until 16.00 with many enrichment activities/sessions ongoing. We make full use of the pupil deprivation grant and ensure it is used effectively to ensure each pupil maximises his/her time at school. The outcome of efsm pupil is in line with Welsh average.

Literacy and numeracy

To ensure that the provision of skills is thoroughly mapped the school has an established literacy coordinator and a numeracy coordinator will be in place from September 2018. Each of the coordinators in post are working on specific plans to address key priorities. Part of their role is to support pupils with literacy and numeracy difficulties through planning and resourcing additional literacy and numeracy lessons at KS3. They are available to support colleagues across the school to plan and deliver skills activities.

In order to improve standards and to engage pupils in reading the Accelerated Reader programme is used in years 7 and 8. This has led to an increase in the numbers of pupils reading regularly with school library records showing a significant increase in the amount of books being borrowed. The most recent National Reading and Numeracy Test data continues to put the school in line with Welsh averages. The tests are now moving towards being used for formative assessment purposes and within the next three years will all be online with pupils receiving individual feedback.

Welsh

Celebrating and promoting the Welsh language, and culture, continues to be a school priority. The school has an excellent relationship with Yr Urdd which saw a number of year 8 and 9 students spending three days at Glan Llyn in Bala. We also celebrated Welsh culture via our annual Eisteddfod.

Standards in Welsh 2nd language are good. 84% of our year 9 pupils achieved L5+ at key stage 3, above Denbighshire and Welsh averages and placing us in the 1st quartile.

Performance at GCSE shows great promise with 77% of the year 11 cohort sitting the full course qualification with a 65% A*-C pass rate.

1.2 Wellbeing

Attendance remained a key priority with the whole school attendance target in 17/18 being raised to 97%. All About Attendance continued to be used to introduce initiatives, maintain the focus and rewards. Our Attendance Champion, Hannah Masson, kept a robust and strong focus on attendance along with the pastoral teams. Attendance rose by 0.4% to 93.5% at the end of the academic year which is the highest attendance rate the school had in years. The numbers of Persistent Absentees (pupils with attendance of 80% or below) also dropped by 1.2% to the lowest it has been in years. The school has now moved to quartile three for attendance. Of the absence, 4.0% was due to illness or medical reasons (4.4% in 16/17) and 0.4% was due to holiday absences (0.6% in 16/17). Unauthorised absences accounted for 1.2% of absence (1.1% in 16/17) and the school continues to implement the DCC fixed penalty notice system to address this.

Behaviour remained a key priority last academic year. There were some improvements in behaviour accross the school with a reduction in both Isolation Room referrals and Fixed Term Exclusions. The move to a year based pastoral sytem was effective, and pupils continue to receive highly effective pastoral care from their year teams. The Assistant Head of Year is a non-teaching member of staff who is at the forefront of pupil wellbeing and behaviour. Along with the Heads of Year they are a regular presence in lessons monitoring behaviour across the school. A number of pupils worked their way off the behaviour structure altogether and others were very successful in reducing their behavioural incidents. A small minority of students still cause some disruption, and these pupils are moved quickly up the behaviour structure and support put in place

to help them improve their behaviour to ensure that they do not continue to be a disruptive influence on the learning of others.

2.1 Learner experiences

The school continues to provide a broad and balanced curriculum with an extensive range of options at key stages 3 and 4. A range of vocational and academic course allow all pupils to pursue courses in which they can achieve. Given the size of our 6th form, we offer nearly 35 level 3 courses.

2.2 Teaching and assessment

The considerable changes made to teaching and assessment systems since September 2016 have led to an improvement in the quality of work and in the attitude of pupils in their lessons. Standards in books and in lessons continue to improve over time and the schools judgements have been validated by external bodies such as GwE and Estyn. In autumn 2017, 76% of teaching was judged to be good or better. By summer 2018 book reviews across the school reviews showed that standards of teaching continued to improve, the percentage of books judged to be at least good was 84%. Pupil engagement in learning is good and instances of poor behaviour in lessons are rare and are dealt with appropriately. The assessment schedule is well organised and understood by all pupils. Feedback to pupils is developing well with teachers giving relevant and useful advice to pupils on how to improve at regular assessment points, this has assisted progress in learning with many pupils having a good understanding of what they need to do to make progress.

2.3 Care, Support and Guidance

The school continues to invest heavily in pastoral support for pupils to ensure safeguarding and support for wellbeing remain a high priority. Pastoral issues can be challenging and the school works closely with a range of outside agencies to support such matters. The school works in close partnership with agencies such as CAMHS, North Wales Police, Barnardo's, Children's Services, Youth Services, TAF, The Pop In, TRAC, amongst others.

2.4 Learning Environment

The site management team do an excellent job in maintaining a positive learning environment. The school employs a very effective daytime cleaner who ensures toilet facilities are kept in good order. A 'follow you printing' system allows all pupils and staff to print off their work in high quality multi-function devices located around the site.

Redevelopment of the school site is ongoing with the new toilet facilities in all three blocks and new PE changing facilities now complete. We are awaiting the funding so that we can begin the next phase of our improvements which includes fencing at the front of the school and a new corridor across the quad to reduce congestion. These facilities will give all pupils a better and safer experience in our school.

Ongoing improvements to internal décor of the school have also taken place so we now have a smart and business-like environment.

The school building is continuously being monitored and modernised, led by Steve Dennis and his team to make sure it is the best learning environment possible.

3.1 Leadership

Since the Estyn monitoring visit in March 2017 the school has continued to make progress in all areas of the school from behaviour and attendance, a new wonderful uniform and outcomes. Whilst the results are lower than expected at GCSE, the school is proud of our achievements in the current much more difficult exam environment.

The internal systems that are in place ensure that the school delivers on the improvement plan and self-evaluation report, which are extremely effective in helping us implement our priorities and evaluate their impact. We now have increasingly sophisticated data tracking systems to ensure all pupil progress is monitored and leads to specific and effective interventions, as required. The school is currently looking at further enhancing our data analysis tools with the use of SMID at KS3 and 4. We now use ALPS connect at KS5 for in-depth data analysis and performance tracking. Such approaches have been instrumental in seeing standards rise.

During 2017/18 there were no changes to the permanent members of the senior leadership team.

The last academic year saw the introduction of Year teams and a move away from Houses which has had an extremely positive impact on how we monitor and deal with all pastoral issues.

The school is fortunate to have such a committed and experienced governing body under the leadership of Mrs. L. Davenport, chairperson, who are passionate about the school and freely give of their time to support and challenge as required.

We would also like to thank our outgoing head boy and girl team (Sam Davidson, Jack Bailey, Josh Hayward, Lauren Safhill, Lauren Roberts and Charlotte Griffiths). We wish them well at university. Our new team have already made an impact and we look forward to working with them as they represent the student body over the coming year. (Samuel Bastow, Tomos Davies, Lydia Hughes, Ellie Macdonald, Niamh McCormack, Katie Sheridan and Victoria Slugocki).

3.2 Improving Quality

A rigorous QA system for monitoring the standards of teaching and assessment is in place. Pupil work is frequently scrutinised and lessons are observed regularly. These measures are successfully identifying areas of strength and weakness which can then be addressed. Quality assurance measures indicate that standards are rising across the whole school.

3.3 Partnership Working

We maintain strong partnerships with other local schools, especially within our cluster and family of primary schools. We meet regularly and really appreciate the strong bonds we have with them. The current focus of the cluster is working together to share a common plan to develop the new curriculum for Wales. Within the town, good links having been developed with local businesses, churches and community services such as the youth service, Pop In, library, police and health providers. The ISPY network is another good example of what can be achieved when we work together.

A further development is how closely PHS is working with the Coastal Alliance group of schools (BEJ, RHS and Eal). The four schools have worked closely on school improvement and supporting each other and now are putting in place an alternative provision for disengaged Year 11s who are finding school difficult and college may not be the best place for them.

Attendance at parents' evenings is very good overall, but we would encourage all parents and carers to engage with us whenever there is any concern. The school website has just been improved and modernised and is an increasingly effective means of communication with all stakeholders. The website, twitter account and Facebook page is updated regularly by our resource team.

We value the contribution parents make and the impact the effective use of social media can have, but we do need to remind all parents that we will not tolerate the inappropriate use of social media or online abuse.

3.4 Resource Management

As with all public services, there is financial pressure on the school but the budget is ably managed by the finance committee of the governing body. Supported by the governors, the Headteacher carried out a restructure and redundancy programme during the academic year where difficult decisions had to be made. The budget is now forecast to be balanced over the next 3 years and effective going forward into the future. A financial statement is included in the report. The school benefits greatly from the effective resource management of the admin, caretaking and technical teams and is very efficient in its use of resources.








